

Late French Immersion



Project: ***“Monkey Madness in Motion”***

Learners created a 3D paverpol sculpture relating to individual creative stories. Ultimately, they chose the moment in the story that is the climax and changes the story. They captured a moment in time and created a fabric sculpture. Learners worked with the artist to explore the subject and its movements and capture the moment through their paverpol creation. 24 grade 5 students participated

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Montague Consolidated School

Project: ***Celebrating Canada and the PEI Red Fox***

Artist: ***David Trimble***

Learners individually created a 16 X 20 acrylic portrait of the Prince Edward Island red fox identifiable in its natural habitat. As students worked on these individual portraits, they also created and prepared documentation to request that the Prince Edward Island Legislative Assembly adopt the red fox as the provincial animal. A request to amend the Provincial Emblem and Honours Act to name the red fox as the provincial animal will leave a legacy for the celebration of Canada's 150th.

And the students send letters...

A letter on behalf of the 21 grade 5 students of Montague Consolidated was sent to the Standing Committee on Education and Economic Development in May 2017. The letter requested that the Committee consider endorsing and forwarding the letter to the Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island for the consideration of naming the red fox as a provincial animal by amending the Symbols and Emblems Act, therefore enabling the red fox to be acknowledged as a true representation of PEI's culture and heritage as a celebration of Canada's 150th year as a nation.

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Birchwood Intermediate School

Project: Rejuvenate and Create

The Rejuvenate and Create project is the Celtic symbolism for the birch tree. During this experience, learners explored the prospect of integrating the birch tree to represent their school to enhance the learning experience. A series of paintings depicted birch trees in each season. Learners also composed and presented poems relating to the symbolism of the season.

The My Community project allowed learners to inquire into why events, people, and ideas are significant to our history and how things have changed and will evolve over time. A large collaborative art piece was developed to demonstrate the students' findings and create a visual description of the past, present and future.

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École Pierre Chiasson School

Project: *Les instruments de musique autour du monde*

Assisted by artist Lynn Gaudet, learners created an Acadian-coloured mural illustrating instruments from around the world. As they explored geometric shapes, learners discovered instruments from different times and places around the globe, providing them with a multicultural experience.

The project was unveiled during the National Francophone Immigration Week and made possible with the contribution of various organizations.

59 kindergarten to grade 12 students

École Pierre-Chiasson, located in Deblois, unveiled its beautiful new mural during National Francophone Immigration Week. The mural depicts dozens of musical instruments from around the world and from different eras.

The students designed and painted the art wall with the help of local artist Lynn Gaudet, who was assigned to the project.

"I worked full-time over a period of six or seven days, collaborating with each group of students," says Lynn Gaudet. "Everyone contributed to the project in one way or another. We did some research to learn more about the origin of the instruments. The students did a great job working on the project."

Everyone can now appreciate the school's new artwork and learn something new about different musical instruments. The whole project came together with the help of various organizations, including financial support from the Coopérative d'intégration francophone and GénieArts, a provincial government program. The Fédération culturelle de l'Î.-P.-É. supported the project by adding a musical component to the unveiling, among other things. The Conseil Rev.-S.-É.-Perrey also lent its support, and Michaels offered the school a discount to buy art supplies in their store.

Marlyse Anakeu, who recently became the Island's Awareness Activity and Community Dialogue Coordinator for the Coopérative d'intégration francophone, represented her organization at the unveiling. She was thrilled to see the outcome of the project along with the other attendees.

"We contributed \$2000 to the project – and I think the result speaks for itself!" says Marlyse Anakeu. "I think the students gained a wonderful intercultural awareness by studying these musical instruments."

Project: La société italienne de la Renaissance

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Learners created a small figurine depicting a person from the Renaissance period. These figurines stand approximately 16 inches and are constructed using a wire frame and sculpted with tin foil and natural fabric with fibres/yarn for the hair. These figurines are finished with pigment/acrylics using a dry brush technique or a patina.



Each figurine is accompanied by descriptive text that demonstrates learner understanding of the actions of various social groups during the Renaissance, following their research on this historical period.



Learners performed in small groups in the Jazz genre. Each learner created an impromptu solo over a rhythm section. Through this process, learners developed confidence to organize their own combos and put together a piece for a performance.

ArtsSmarts Brings Artists Into Schools

Students at schools across Prince Edward Island are learning from local artists through the Canada-wide ArtsSmarts program. ArtsSmarts injects arts into core academic subjects such as math, languages, social studies, and science by bringing artists into the classroom to share their skills and talents. The artists work with teachers to integrate arts disciplines like visual and literary arts, dance, music, and theatre into students' lessons.

'Engaging our young people in artistic activity helps them evolve into creative thinkers,' Education, Early Learning and Culture Minister Doug Currie said. ArtsSmarts uses the arts to ignite students' excitement to learn, and to inspire collaboration between artists and educators in giving our students the best educational experience we can.'

ArtsSmarts is providing 268 students at eight Island schools the opportunity to learn through the arts during the 2016-17 school year. As projects are carried out, students, teachers and artists can share their experiences with all Islanders on social media with the hashtag #ArtsSmartsPEI.
