Link to curriculum:	Social studies	

Cultural diversity is a richness that can be explored in a variety of ways. The young and the notso-young benefit from exploring similarities and differences between different cultures. The goal of this project was to highlight African culture through mask making. By exploring the history of African culture and discovering the materials used in mask making as well as the role of these masks in heritage expression, students had the opportunity to learn about a culture that is different from theirs, while expressing their creativity.

The Acadian and Francophone community, and the Evangeline area in particular, is recognized for the quality of its singer/songwriters. The goal of this project was to create a song following a review of the Acadian song repertoire and Prince Edward Island's Francophone singer/songwriters. Students had the opportunity to refine their listening skills and broaden their musical knowledge. In addition, they were able to discover the artistic process involved in creating a song, with its words and music.

The Acadia of Prince Edward Island and the Acadia of the Atlantic provinces are part of a larger whole, that of the worldwide French-speaking community. The goal of this project was to increase the feeling of belonging and recognition of the ties between the Acadian and Francophone culture on the Island and the international French-speaking community. Students were able to compare cultural elements such as music, dress, art, food, and way of life. They then created three wall frescoes representing Acadia within the French-speaking community.

Elm Street Elementary

Project: Canadian Critters in Colours

Grades: 4 and 6

Link to curriculum: Language arts, math, science, technology

Canada is recognized for its plants and wildlife, its wide-open spaces, and its artistically inspiring landscapes. The goal of this project was to have each student paint a picture of an animal native to Canada. Students had the opportunity to discover basic drawing techniques as well as paint-application techniques. They then painted their own pictures using acrylics. They also learned about Canadian and Island visual artists. Together, students prepared a class logbook for tracking the project's progress and noting down the comments of their teachers and parents.

A theme song is based on the concept of appropriation of shared symbols in order to create a greater feeling of belonging to a given group. The goal of this project was to write a theme song for the school, using the themes of the school's past, present, and future. Angèle Arsenault, a PEI singer/songwriter of world renown, helped students explore activities such as the search for ideas, poetic writing, melodic composition, and musical arrangement. Students also had a chance to learn about the planning, execution, and professional production of a musical recording.

Central Queens Elementary

Link to curriculum: Visual arts, language arts, math, music, science, social studies

The environment is certainly a hot topic these days, but the beauty of the environment and the landscapes that surround us is also a source of inspiration for artists. The goal of this project was to get students thinking about the beauty of the environment through visual art and music. Students were asked to write a song inspired by a painting and then create a painting inspired by a song. Each class had the opportunity to work with either the painter or the singer/songwriter for the purpose of exploring the process leading to the creation of a visual work or a song.

Sculpture is a multi-faceted artistic discipline that offers a multitude of options when it comes to the variety of materials used. During this project, students learned techniques for creating a sculpture from recycled objects. They used old wooden toy blocks, which they painted and decorated, to create a group sculpture. Students were asked to search for ways of putting the blocks together, modifying them, and making an interactive sculpture to which other students at the school could eventually contribute.

On the Island, the primary industries of fishing and agriculture have been economic engines for centuries. The goal of this project was to highlight the importance of fishing, agriculture, and the residents of the community of Grand Tracadie from the 1800s until today by means of three exterior murals. The murals were designed and built by the students with the artist's help. As part of their research, students visited the Provincial Archives and the Artifactory. They also interviewed some seniors in the community of Grand Tracadie.
